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Course Description:

This seminar gives students a chance to read and critically analyze classic sacred writings in translation from the South Asian traditions, Hinduism and Buddhism. The genres sampled will include a hymns, ritual texts, ascetic mysticism, biography, popular narrative, and scholastic treatises. We will also consider the cross-cultural definition of "text," hermeneutical approaches to exegesis, the idea of a "scriptural canon," and the construction of "text" in the western historical imagination.

Course Design and Expectations:

This course is designed to give us a chance to carefully read, analyze, and discuss central texts in the history of the two great world religions in South Asia. Joining the class entails the expectation that members will complete reading assignments in preparation for class, lead discussions of assigned topics, engage with the material, and take an active role in class discussions. Course assignments will entail the freedom for individuals to explore topics, themes, and genres of personal interest.

Weekly Course Posting. Each student once a week – by 3 pm Thursday – will submit three sentences regarding that day's textual reading under the Moodle heading DISCUSSION FORUMS (at the top of the web page). A new Seminar Discussion heading with the date will be posted weekly, where every student should make this posting every week. These weekly commentary will provide a portion of the "Class Participation" grade.

The first two sentences should refer to specific passages from the reading (include page numbers) that cite major points in the text. The third sentence should pose a question for the seminar to consider.
